The citizen empowerment department of the school thought of working with students of government schools and share their knowledge base with them. Students thought of making a symbolic public-private partnership with these schools. This could turn on a new exchange of teaching methods in schools and learn from each other. It is evident that quality of education given in private school is different from that of government schools.

Idea into action - Bridging the quality gap

Students of class 6th from citizen empowerment department of St. Mary's School went to Government Co-ed higher secondary school with prior permission with the principal of the school. They went there to talk them about right to education. Students did requisite preparations by a discussion about RTE in the class and prepared chart papers for same. They also planned to share an activity using newspaper to learn grammar.

For students, it was first exposure to such type of activity. They started with explaining Right to education that government made this law that children of age group 6-14 years should get free education in this whole process students of government school showed curiosity in



understanding the right to education. They were also keen to ask what if these rights were infringed by someone or other. St. Mary's students tried to answer the entire question with the help of their facilitator of this programme. Students focused on understanding things by creating interest in the subject. To make them understand in proper way students gave them newspaper cutting and asked them to underline nouns present in those articles. This activity was taught them by their English teacher. Most of the students in school found out almost every noun in their respective articles. When students came back to the school they were asked to write and report about what they did in school and discuss.

Analysing ourselves

After the activity students discussed what they did. Students also wrote a short report about their experiences. They really enjoyed working with students. Students also critically analysed themselves about their mode of language as students were not comfortable with Hindi. They also thought that they lacked in preparation and coordination among themselves. They also enjoyed seeing students taking interest in what they were sharing with them.

Facilitating students in this manner gives mutual benefit for both of them. Knowledge given in schools when shared with someone leads to experience and this is one way of learning (Report compiled by Krishna Singh, Trainee, M.A Semester 1, Department of Social Work, University of Delhi).
