Day 5-

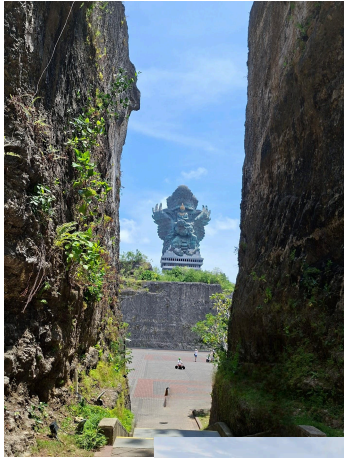
25th October (Saturday): Exploring South Bali

- We first explored Nusa Dua and visited a beach in the morning. Ki

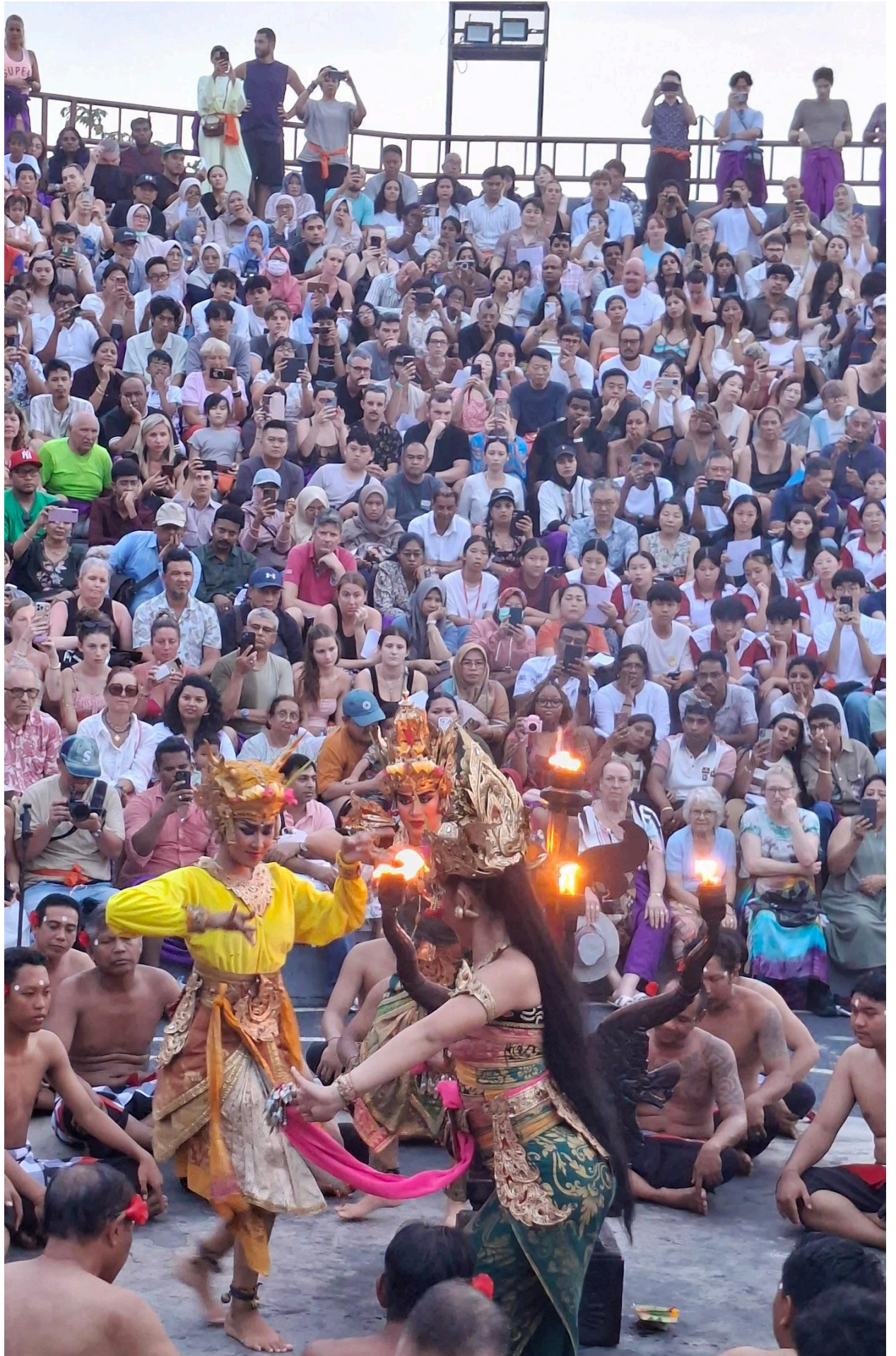


- Afterwards, we explored Garuda Wisnu Kencana Cultural Park and looked around the various statues of the gods from hindu mythology and admired its beauty.

- Explored Ubud Art Market and saw beautiful local crafts.

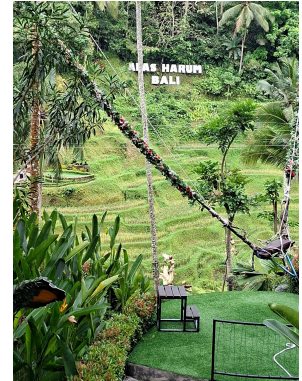


- We went to Kedisan (Rice Terrace) and enjoyed adventurous activities– Bali swing, zip line, bridges etc...

27th October (Monday): Departure

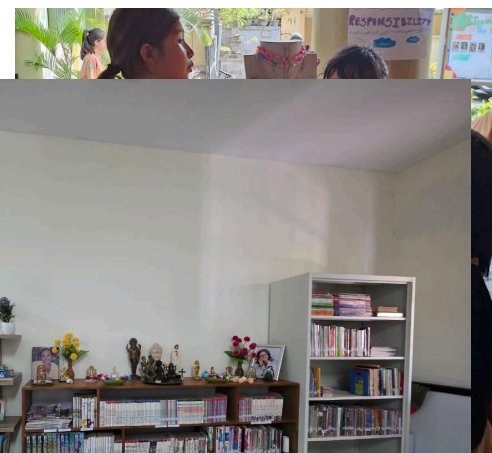
- We left the hotel early and reached the airport by 7:30 AM.
